Because my mother grew up during the years of the “Great Depression”, she would often talk about the difficulties her family faced. No work. . . no money for clothes or shoes. . . no heat . . . and sometimes no food. Largely because of her experience, I was raised to be thrifty: we saved everything from wrapping paper to rubber bands and string. We cleaned with cold water, so we wouldn’t waste money to run the water heater. I wore my brother’s hand me downs, and we shopped regularly at the Good Will store. We washed and reused jars and bottles—there was no Tupperware. We took care of things, so they would last. To waste anything was a sin.

I grew up thinking about life the same way: don’t waste money. Be careful of your possessions. Take care of the environment. Protect the waterways. Be thrifty with the physical gifts God has given you—like a house or church building. Eat your vegetables and clean your plate.

When I became a Christian, I thought being a good steward had to do with

saving money, only buying what you really needed, and conserving by turning off the lights and heat when you didn’t need them. Being a good steward meant getting the best deal on every purchase, so the money would go further. Stewardship meant protecting ourselves. Somehow stewardship was linked with the fear of not having enough if we wasted or misused our resources.

While those may seem like responsible practices, they miss the point of biblical

stewardship. Biblical stewardship means using all of God’s resources for God’s purposes, and not our purposes. With the understanding that everything we have comes from God and belongs to God, as stewards we are first to discern God’s will, and then use the resources God has given us to obey. Stewardship involves the whole of life, everything a Christian does after he or she says “yes” to the Lordship of Christ.

We are to use our God-given talents in God’s service. Our time is not our own, but is God’s resource. Our bodies are to be treated as temples of the Holy Spirit,

which belong to God. God may ask us to spend money we would rather save. God may ask us to forgo something like new carpeting for ourselves, in order to help the poor. God may ask us to spend our time for others instead of for ourselves. God may ask us to stop being so concerned for our own comfort, and to remember the church doesn't exist for us, but so that we will share the good news of salvation with others. Stewardship doesn't have to do with fear of not having enough for ourselves, but in serving a God of infinite resources. Stewardship means trusting God to take care of us, as we are obedient to God.


Stewardship doesn't have to do with fear of not having enough for ourselves, but in serving a God of infinite resources.

Stewardship isn't about our scarcity but about God's abundance—God has been generous with us, so we in turn can be generous toward others, using all we have and all we are to the glory of God. When we are stewards, we do what God wants, not what we want. We do what God asks, not what makes sense to us.

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




