Come one, come all.

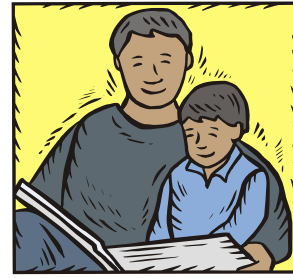
All are always welcome to join the choir. But at this time, we especially need women--sopranos and altos.

Please call Pastor Stephanie (886-3441) during January or early February, so we can pick a day and time that is best for those involved.

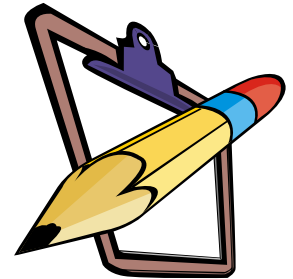

NEWS FROM DONNA

Indonesia

Note: This is Part 2 of Donna's article about their July visit to Bali.

They loved cock fights and all along our way I saw roosters in cages. My guide explained that gambling is forbidden in Hinduism but that one or twice a year, it is allowed as a religious rite. "Sure," I said. There is an over-population of dogs which are now infected with rabies. This has become a serious problem and the government had a couple thousand dogs killed. The people were so unhappy that they stopped. But then the island ran out of rabies vaccines and so the problem continues as more and more people are dying of rabies.

Education is provided only for the rich in Bali. By law all children must attend school but in the highlands there are no roads, schools, or money. Our guide explained the money for education never makes it to the island but instead ends up in someone's pocket. That is Indonesia.

We drove to the island's largest and still active volcano. It was huge! People are now forbidden to live on its sides because they get killed, but we saw lots of people planting crops like tomatoes and corn in the lava soil. There was a lake at the base of the volcano and a hotel where we had lunch and bathed in the hot springs. We stopped by coffee plantations on the way back to see the crops they grew and to see how they make their famous dung coffee that is the rage in Asia. They cage ferrets and feed them coffee beans. From the animal dung, they take out the undigested beans and make coffee. People love this stuff. We said, "No, thanks."

They make quilts in Bali. My quilt teacher here in Singapore employs a whole village to do the needlework on quilt tops. They make beautiful Batik material there too. We marveled at the wood work, sculptures, and even painting they do there. Tourism is their only business. We sat out on the beach for two mornings. The water was beautiful and there was no trash. Why? My guide explained that the trash is dumped out to sea and comes back with the current about March. Then they pick it up again and ship it back out. Because it was July, we were in between trash pickups! The best season, he said, for tourists. That night we went to the monkey

cliffs overlooking the sea. There the wild monkeys live, living incarnation of some god and so they are protected from hunting. They are large and quite mean. We were warned to take our glasses off, hide our camera, take out my earrings, and keep our hands out of our pockets. This we did but the Chinese didn't get the memo. While we were there, a monkey pulled off the glasses of a boy and tore them apart and then tossed them over the cliff. I think thinning out some monkeys would improve the place, gods or not.

Bali is also the place where Al Quada bombed a nightclub and killed over 200 people, mostly Australians. They have a monument there to honor the dead, their 9/11 they call it. It was a double blow, aimed at the tourists and aimed at the Bali people who are Hindu. Did I notice more security? They do have guards to let you into the hotel. At lunch time, they never bothered. Sometimes they were napping. Ah, well. The terrorists seem to have bigger targets in mind these days.

Only one incident marred our vacation in Bali. The professional beggars. When you sit on the beach, you are besieged by women and men trying to sell you something—drink, food, beads, carvings, you name it. "No. No. No," we chanted over and over. Then we decided, after seeing how the people really live, to pass out some American dollars. That was our mistake. They came from everywhere and would not leave us alone. We had to physically get up and leave to get away. We never did that again. We bought souvenirs in the airport.

Next time, our trip to Cambodia.

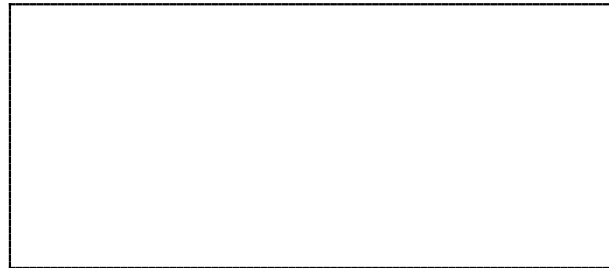

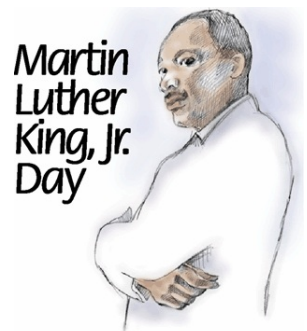
