John Wesley's Methodist Class Meetings or Covenant Groups

The heart of Methodism during the life of John Wesley was the Methodist Class Meeting. This was a small covenant discipleship support group (accountability discipleship) where members were accountable to each other. They confessed their faults one to another, prayed for each other, and stirred up one another to love and good works. Here the teachings of the Bible were examined in light of actual personal experience. Here leaders were nurtured and equipped.

“Confess your faults one to another and pray one for another...”

“Bear ye one another’s burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ...”

When Stephanie Sault was our pastor, she encouraged us to establish covenant groups, and several groups were started. One of those groups, amazingly and thankfully, still exists. Faithful Friends, includes Jim and Sandra Clemmer, Tom and Connie Davis, Jeff and Ellen DeLong, Jerry and Caroline Jones, and Jim and Vicki Printy.

We meet regularly, at least one or two times a month, in each other’s homes. Occasionally we meet strictly for social reasons, but generally our meetings are focused on our spiritual growth and concerns. We have varied our discussions, at times doing book studies, DVD series, or simply

discussions about our personal issues- we all share concerns about children, grandchildren, elderly parents, and health issues.

Covenant groups normally have six to twelve members. They offer members expanding opportunities for growth, caring, connection within a congregation. Members support each other through the transitions, challenges, and joys which life brings. Groups may meet for specific time periods, 3 to 6 or more months, or may meet indefinitely.

Personally, I know how beneficial and rewarding the Faithful Friends group has been for me, and I think each member would agree. As much as we’ve benefited personally, I believe as a result of the covenant group we have each become more committed and more deeply involved in the life of the church. Pastor Won has expressed the desire for each member of Central to join a covenant group. I hope you will prayerfully consider Won’s request.

Central Bands (CB)

John Wesley, the founding father of the Methodist Church, was brilliant in how he organized the church. This came from years of trial and error, adopting and assimilating, and with careful balance of the works of piety and the works of mercy.

His unique adoption from the Moravian tradition was what is known as *ecclesiolae in ecclesia* which means, "little churches within the church." Over the years, church leaders and theologians learned the vital importance of the small group. The simple truth is that close bonds exist among a few friends. Even Jesus had close bonds with twelve others.

A small group contains between six and twelve people, called a cell or, as John Wesley named it, "Band". This size is personal and intimate, and one can feel close and safe in sharing oneself. The next group size has from twenty to fifty people, and John Wesley named it "Class". As the word indicates, it is a learning group, an ideal size for seminar, workshop, Sunday school, and Bible study. The next size up is one hundred-plus size. John Wesley named it "Society". This is an ideal size for worship. On a side note, Central is inching up to one hundred in worship size (and if we have three Sundays with over one hundred attending, I promised I will sing to you a hymn of your choice in Louis Armstrong Style.

My vision for Central Church is to form seven to nine Central Bands. The idea is to have each group (eight to ten members

and adding one-to-two home bounds) support its members the way good friends do for each other: prayers, study the word together, keep in touch, lend helping hands, meet regularly, dine together, go out together, and, in hard times, support in any way needed. Each Band will grow into its unique personality and that is quite all right. There are many reasons why groups may fail to continue and one of the reasons is a cookie-cutter program that comes down from the top administration. My belief is that the small group (or any other group) must be formed by a ground-up process and be willing to change as needed. Another reason why groups discontinue is because one strong personality dominates the group. Or, the group may live out its usefulness. This can happen to any group over time.

Formation of CB

1. For the next few Sundays, you will receive a blank card.
2. On this blank card, you will write down the names of your close friends (as many as you can think in Central Church).
3. You will put the card on the offering plate during the offering time.
4. Once I receive the cards, I will randomly assign you to one of the **CBs** keeping in mind your friend preferences as much as possible.
5. Once all **CBs** are formed, I will meet with each Band to listen to the group's hopes and dreams for that particular **Band**.
6. Identify one person from the **Band** as a coordinator.

CBs will have a tryout period of four meetings. After the fourth meeting, you will be allowed to change your **Band**. My hope is that **Bands** will continue for years to come and grow to love one another as brothers and sisters in Christ. I also hope and dream that every member will belong to a Central Band of your choice.

For newcomers, my thought is to profile each band (i.e., age, interest, how often they meet, what they study as a band, and such) and list it in booklet format and have it available to present to them and emphasize the importance of belonging to one of the Bands.

This is but one step closer to working me out of my job! I pray each day that it will come but not too soon because I'm having so much fun being a pastor to you folks.

On a more serious note, soon we will enter the season of Lent. Our first event was the Ash Wednesday Service at noon this past Wednesday at Central UMC. Following that are five weeks of Lenten Luncheons. I'm happy to share with you this year UMC Lenten Luncheons, have grown from five churches to eight churches! We now have added Augusta St., Jollivue, and St. Paul from our district.

Thanks to Suzanne Noto, Central Communicator, who has designed a beautiful brochure which explains the theme, schedule, and the ministry our offerings will support this year.

Thanking God each day - what fun and a privilege to serve and work with you at Central UMC. May God unceasingly bless each of us and the Central UMC's mission and ministry.

Central United Methodist Women members wish to thank our faithful and generous congregation for its continuing support of our mission projects, which touch the lives of women and children not only close to home but also around the world.

Our 2015 mission projects are both ambitious and exciting. See how you can help:

- **Henry Fork Service Center:** The green tub has been filled and its contents will be delivered shortly. Because HFSC serves children year-round, their needs continue year-round. Please continue to donate paper towels, 13- and 19-gallon trash bags, toilet paper, and hand soap. While these items are not particularly exciting, they are a necessary part of the scaffold that supports the children who participate in HFSC programs. If you would like to support an individual on his/her birthday (every child at HFSC gets a gift on his/her birthday), simply purchase a gift (no more than \$10 in value), wrap it in birthday paper, and label it as a gift for a boy or girl of a certain age range. For example, a jewelry making set might be a great gift for a girl between the ages of 8-11. A Nerf football might be a great gift for a boy between the ages of 6-10. Put your gifts in the green tub and they will be delivered along with supplies that are collected.
- **Birthing Kits:** This year we will send 40 kits to conference. We are delighted to report that the major supplies for these kits have already been purchased. We will assemble them on June 7, 2015 – our Ubuntu Day of Service.
- **Sewing Kits:** After learning that sewing kits are in heavy demand throughout the world, Central UMW members decided to set a goal of 25 sewing kits to send to conference. Each kit requires 3 continuous yards of colorful cotton or cotton-blend fabric, a pair of fabric scissors, 8 buttons, a package of needles, and a spool of matching thread. Materials needed for these kits are fairly expensive. The proceeds from our February bake sale (“A Stitch in Time”) totaled \$306.50 and will support purchase of materials for sewing kits. Also, if individuals wish to purchase a pre-made kit, the cost is \$35.00.
- **All God’s Children Camp Scholarships:** The cost of sending one child to camp for one week is \$450. Central UMW members would like to send two children to camp this summer. We are very grateful to Beth Christian, Staunton District Director of Congregational Resources, for sharing about the All God’s Children camps (one on the James River and one on the Eastern Shore). A United Methodist initiative, All God’s Children camps offer a full camp experience to children for whom at least one parent is incarcerated. By the way, the December Cookie Walk raised nearly \$360 toward the first scholarship!

UMW members at Central and around the globe are dedicated to making a difference one life at a time, just as Jesus would have us do. Thank you for joining us in our efforts to eradicate injustice, reverse poverty, and uplift the forgotten wherever they might exist.

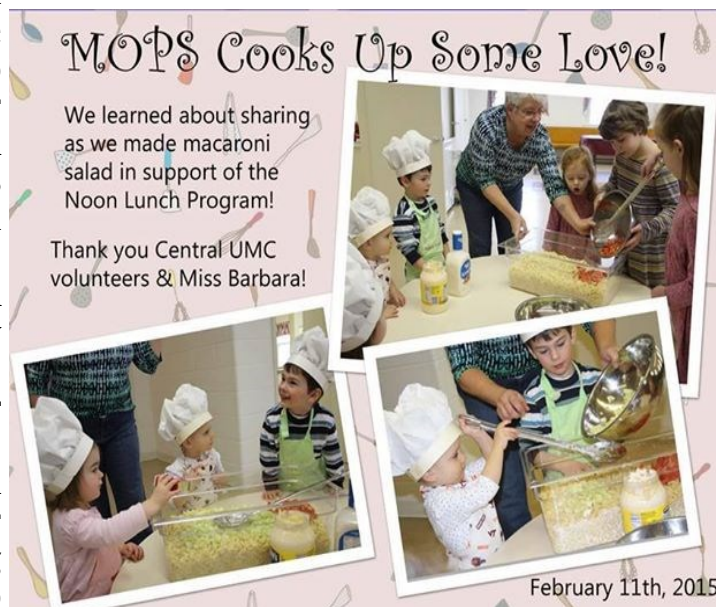
Love is in the air at MOPS!

Mothers packed bag lunches for the little ones who enjoyed a showing of "Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood" projected on the wall. They enjoyed having a warm place to ride trikes, run and play. Mothers, of course enjoyed the chance to meet each other! Word is spreading about MOPS and we are growing each month! One mother recently shared with me that while driving her son in downtown Staunton, he recognized another member and exclaimed, "Look, Mommy! There goes a mop!".

If you know of a mother with a pre-schooler who would be interested in getting to know some other moms, please let her know about our group! We love mothers, and mothers love children, and at MOPS we truly believe that together we can raise a better world! We've talked a lot about love this month.
