Update from Trustees

We are so blessed to have our beautiful facility: the sanctuary, classrooms and meeting spaces. In addition to our worship services and outreach efforts, we believe that part of our ministry is to make our building available for use by others in the community. Weight Watchers has been meeting in the Fellowship Hall for many years. Narcotics Anonymous groups meet in Eagon Hall three evenings/week. The first floor of our education building is kept busy with our Clothes Closet and Food Pantry, and third floor is busy with Girl Scouts, Prison Ministry and Sewing Group. With so much building usage, it takes a great deal of work, and money, to keep the church properly maintained. We are blessed to have the resources we need to do this.

The building issue which has been most critical during the past year has been the elevator upgrade, which was completed on April 3. This has been a \$60,000 project made possible with the generous Endowment Funds we have received. We were also able to use funds from the recent sale of the vacant lot bequeathed to Central by Gail Ticknor. Much thanks to Doug Noland for his legal assistance in the sale.

In addition to the major elevator project, we have recently had to complete many smaller, more routine projects, including electrical, plumbing, and heating. We are blessed to have the talents of Mike Melton, Sam Richardson, Ed Smith, and Jack True who are always available to donate their expertise to the church.

You may be aware that this spring the city is going to begin a renovation project on the parking garage located behind city hall. During the renovation, beginning sometime in April, the city will be renting half of Central's large parking lot for \$75/week. The city will be using the two rows of parking spaces nearest to Frederick Street, from 7:30 am until 5:30 pm Monday through Friday. We will be reserving the remaining two rows of parking spaces for Central use, and will ask that others who are presently using the lot, such as Second Presbyterian, make other arrangements. The renovation is expected to be completed by late fall.

The Trustees thank you for your support and understanding in our efforts to provide a safe and welcoming place to worship and serve God. If you have questions or concerns related to the building please feel free to discuss with one of the Trustees: Leslie Artley, Bill Bushman, Martha Bushman, Ellen DeLong, Mike Melton, Jim Printy, Sam Richardson, Ed Smith, and Beth White.

Barbara’s Tater Tot Casserole

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- ½ cup milk
- 8 oz. shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 lb. bag tater tots
- salt and pepper

- 1) Brown beef with onion and drain. Mix soup and milk and stir into beef. Add salt and pepper.
- 2) Spread in bottom of casserole dish.
- 3) Cover meat mixture with cheese.
- 4) Top with tater tots.
- 5) Bake uncovered at 350 for 1 hour, until tater tots are golden.

Food Pantry

Central’s Food Pantry continues to be a strong contributor to the health and welfare of our community by offering nutritious food choices – including fresh produce and bakery items – to all who visit. In January we served 214 Individuals (infants through seniors) representing 98 households. February showed a slight decline with 201 individuals representing 93 households. At the time of this publication (March), 83 individuals representing 41 households had been served. Not surprisingly, client visits fluctuate in winter due to weather conditions since many folks rely on public transportation and/or walking to get their groceries home.

Have you wondered what happens when the pantry isn’t open? How do the shelves get restocked week-to-week? What about the Clothes Closet? I’m glad you asked! It’s time to tip our hats to the volunteer teams who give of their time, energy, vehicles, and gas to ensure that every Wednesday our Food Pantry is stocked and ready. Listed below are the teams. United Methodist Men

The United Methodist Men of Central United Methodist Church could also be called the Monthly Men’s Breakfast Club. We do enjoy our breakfast meetings! But that imagery belies the fact that we undertake various activities on behalf of Central and its many missions through various programs, projects, and sponsorships.

From the United Methodist Church (UMC) General Conference United Methodist Men website (<http://www.gcumm.org/about>):

The 2016 United Methodist Book of Discipline charges the General Commission on United Methodist Men with the “primary oversight for the coordination and resourcing of men’s ministry with The United Methodist Church.” (paragraph 2302)

With this mandate from Nashville, and the long and rich history of United Methodist Men, the Mission of United Methodist Men (UMM) is: “To Help Men Grow in Christ, So Others May Know Christ.” At the General Conference level, this is manifest in Four Areas of Focus:

- Leadership Development
- Church Renewal
- Ministry with the Poor
- Global Health

In the broader sense, how the Mission and the Four Focus Areas are addressed is through the broader rubric of Ministry to Men. At the Central Church level our hearty, well-fed band of UMM is exemplified in the webpage (<http://www.gcumm.org/ministry-to-men>) description of “a core group of men, partnering with their pastor, to invite and initiate spiritual growth, opportunities for all men of the church.” There are described on the webpage several examples that a local church UMM group can undertake that helps support the Mission. In other words, participating and supporting church activities which help achieve the goal of empowering the ministry of Jesus Christ through men within the congregations of the UMC.

At Central, our UMM group has served and is serving by doing specific tasks such as periodic grounds cleanup around the church; providing physical labor and means to help decorate, clean, declutter, relocate material within the church; by supplementing resources needed to make improvements and procure equipment (e.g., kitchen equipment and supplies);

undertake and support fund raising activities of the church (BBQ & Brunswick Stew sales); donations of money and labor to mission trips; providing physical assistance to members’ homes that would otherwise not be possible; donating financial support to the Society of St. Andrew; and many, many other activities and projects currently and in the past.

The one area in which we would like to do better is increasing the number of Central UMC men who participate. Our monthly meeting participation is around 10 -12. We recognize Saturdays, particularly with young families, is a very busy day, and getting out with a packed agenda to enjoy fellowship around a breakfast table may be ‘a bridge too far,’ to borrow a phrase. We would welcome your participation even if it is irregular. We promise the experience will be uplifting and mind expanding. Please watch for our monthly notices of our meeting opportunities.

As the future unfolds for us all at Central, the United Methodist Men will also endeavor to be the supportive, collaborative group we have been. Our UMM provides another way to understand how the work of Central United Methodist Church is important to our ministries, locally and beyond, and that we can all contribute in our own ways “To Help Men Grow in Christ, So Others May Know Christ.”

Those present worked to evaluate vision topics listed below from previous retreats to determine their state of accomplishment.

•**More participation in service by congregation:** Additional members serving as ushers; including youth, participating in worship such as in Faith Sharing Sundays.

•**More Bible Study:** Providing more opportunities for Bible Study sessions for adults and youth/children participants.

•**Christian Education:** Work to provide young adult & adult Sunday School.

•**Joint ecumenical events:** Joining with Augusta Street Methodist in worship opportunities

•**Sponsorship of a school Community Garden**

•**Family Fun Day:** working jointly with Staunton Housing Authority to provide lunch and volunteers

•**Beyond Food Pantry**
