

Dear Centralites,

United Methodism is currently undergoing an identity crisis while trying to determine whether we are an inclusive church or an exclusive church. If you ask me, my answer is very clear: inclusive church.

United Methodism held a special General Conference last month and voted to be an exclusive church by upholding the current Book of Discipline (¶ 304.3: *The practice of homosexuality is* incompatible with Christian teaching. Therefore self -avowed practicing homosexuals are not to be certified as candidates, ordained as ministers, or appointed to serve in The United Methodist Church.)

This month, the Judicial Council will meet to discuss the constitutionality of amendments that were attached to the traditional plan. The new law will take effect January 1st, 2020.

We are living in uncertain United Methodist times, and for that reason we will hear many voices from a variety of theological spectrums claiming to be the true voice of God. The true voice of God is Jesus the Christ and He only. You will find His voice in the four Gospels of the New Testament.

Dear Centralites, there is no need to lose heart or

get confused by the ever-changing winds of teachers and preachers claiming to be the true voice. What the high-level leaders are doing is trying to define orthodoxy (right teaching). Yes, it is important to establish orthodoxy; but, as history taught us, it seems that right teaching changes with time. Examples of shifts in orthodoxy involve slavery, divorce, and other disputes.

However, orthopraxis (right practice) has not changed with time. For example, it is always right practice to love our God and neighbors, welcome and care for others, and lay down our lives for Jesus.

My point is this. Let us carry on God's will for His people despite the uncertain future of our denomination. Let us feed and love the lost, the least, and the last despite what our denomination says as to who we are. Let us be Jesus's people, "Christianist", before we call ourselves traditionalist, progressivist, or centralist.

We are in the midst of Lenten season. I pray you are keeping up with prayer, fasting, and penitence to ready ourselves to experience the resurrection of Jesus the Christ.

UMM Report

The Central United Methodist Men have been active recently, despite the weather that has cancelled several planned events.

We recently completed our Spring fundraiser/ Brunswick Stew Sale. Important to the success of the project was the leadership of Project Leader Tom Davis and the Kitchen Crew. Preparations started early and culminated in the effort which began VERY early Friday morning, March 15. Thanks to the generosity of our congregation and membership, we were able to sell out of the production run of 102 quarts over the weekend. We had good, brisk sales to the general public Saturday morning as well. Preliminary reports from members as to the quality of this year's stew effort are very good. There have been a few ideas floated as to how to enhance the product as we look ahead to this November, when we start the process, again. These ideas include a 'Taste Off,' where various, submitted, recipes are tried. The "winner" being the recipe used in our project. Also, it has been suggested we include (4?) corn muffins per quart as an (optional?) addition to the stew. This would make the purchase a true meal opportunity. Let us know your thoughts; we are always open to new/better ideas.

This Spring's project has raised approximately \$670, after expenses. It will be used for advancing projects that Central UMMen have traditionally done, like the Staunton Rotary Christmas Gift program and the Society of St. Andrew, as well as facilitating purchases of a more immediate nature. For example, we funded procurement of several large heavy duty cook pots for the kitchen. This past January, we gave \$500 to the Church for our broader programs.

Elue Ridge Area FOOD BANK

February 2019 marked the tenth anniversary of the opening of Central's Food Pantry. During its ten-year history, it has morphed from food distribution via a tiny closet to a popular walk-through, self-select program. As part of the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank, we are able to offer both USDA and non-USDA food, including a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables. We also partner with the Staunton Kroger to receive bakery items on a weekly basis.

On average, 18 client families visit Central's Food Pantry each week. For individuals and families who are food insecure, having a local food pantry is vital in that it often makes the difference between putting food on the table, paying rent or getting medications.

No food pantry will succeed without the support of volunteers. Without question, Centralites are key to the success of this vital mission! It is our faithful members who pick up food from the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank every week, stock the shelves, manage the computer intake process, greet and escort clients each Wednesday morning, and run our extremely popular clothes closet. Thanks to the on-going generosity of Centralites, we have never once lacked funds to purchase food or upgrade our program. Because of you, we have a program that not only feeds and clothes our neighbors, we have become a place of friendship, mutual respect, and love.



<u>Recipe Example</u> Five Flavor Pound Cake

Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3 cups sugar
- 5 large eggs
- 3 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup whole milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 tsp. lemon extract
- 1 tsp. rum flavoring
- 1 tsp. coconut flavoring
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup water
- 1/2 tsp. almond extract

Directions: Preheat oven to 325 degrees.

Cream butter and shortening. Gradually add 3 cups sugar, beating well at medium speed with electric mixer. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Stir in vanilla, lemon, rum and coconut flavorings. Pour batter into greased and floured 10 inch tube pane. Bake at 325 degrees for 80-90 minutes, until toothpick comes out clean. Leave cake in pan for 10 minutes. Remove cake from pan and cool on wire rack.

<u>Glaze:</u> Combine 1 cup sugar and 1/3 cup water in small saucepan and bring to boil. Remove from heat and add almond extract. Pour glaze over warm cake, and finish cooling.



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March Council Minutes

The Church Council of Central UMC was called to order by Chairperson Tom Davis at 7:00 pm on March 26, 2019 in the Wesley Fellowship classroom. Sybille Jobin presented the devotion. The minutes from the February 26, 2019 meeting were approved. Those present included Tom Davis, Won Un, Connie Davis, Bill Bushman, Sam Richardson, Sybille Jobin, Jim Printy, Jim Clemmer, Sandra Clemmer, Linda Dinsmore, and Joe Hill.

Committee Reports

Lay Leader: No report.

SPRC: No report.

Finance: Joe Hill distributed the February 28, 2019 financial statement and expressed concern for Central's financial picture. The February statement showed income for the budget was \$12,030.29. As a means of comparison, for 2018 the income was \$14,299.18. 2019 expenses were \$24,557.18 compared to \$22,568.50 in 2018. For January-February, the 2019 income was \$46,483.49 whereas the 2018 income was \$52,001.73 for the same period. The 2019 expenses for this period were \$50,011.86 and the 2018 expenses were \$43,619.52. The Finance Committee recommended that the Easter offering be designated for the general mission and ministry of Central. This motion was approved unanimously by Council.

Endowment: Tom Davis reported the endowments are still strong.

Trustees: Jim Printy reported that a college group from Bowling Green State University stayed at Central the previous weekend. This group was very appreciative of our hospitality. Trustees will meet again on April 2.

Nurture: Sandra Clemmer reported that they will be helping with the yard sale in May. Volunteers are still needed for the Agape Refreshments.

Outreach: Connie Davis reported that we still do not have a family for the Agape meals yet. A load

of wood for the wood ministry has been picked up and is available for distribution. There is a scheduled Socialite in May where there will be a program from the Staunton police about safety in the church. Connie reported that the food pantry has been going well. They are considering revamping the clothes closet. They have applied for a grant for a new refrigerator and freezer. Trinity luncheons are going well. Mary Baldwin has been generous in providing food for our ministries. Connie thanked Diane Baker, Millie Brown, and Sandra Clemmer for helping make the Lenten Luncheon at Central a success with 71 people present.

Choir/Music: No report.

Children and Youth: Mary Douglas reported that the teens are rehearsing for an Easter play. They are collecting candy for the Easter Egg Hunt. They are considering taking the youth to Lake Junaleska. Nursery volunteers are still needed. A teen Sunday School class will be meeting starting in May. A youth room on the 3rd floor has been prepared for them to meet.

UMW: The UMW celebrated 150 years of service at a meeting in Covington. Anita Jackson, Caroline Jones, and Susan Obaugh attended this meeting.

UMM: Bill Bushman reported that 102 quarts of Brunswick Stew had been made and sold. The net income was approximately \$678. He thanked the members of the UMM who worked on this project which was led by Tom Davis. Many UMM members helped. The UMM will be helping with the yard sale in May and may possibly sponsor the sale of BBQ at this event.

At Large: Linda Dinsmore reported on the visitations she, Beth Blackmer, and Sybille Jobin have been making to our VIP members. Linda is in charge of the yard sale and requests volunteers.

Pastor: Pastor Un reported that a letter had been sent to the District Superintendent signed by Tom Davis, Council Chair, about our withholding of apportionments as approved by Council in February. The District Superintendent responded

February Council Minutes

The Church Council of Central UMC was called to order by Chairperson Tom Davis at 6:00 pm on February 26, 2019 in the Wesley Fellowship classroom. Connie Davis presented the devotion. The minutes from the January 22, 2019 meeting were approved. Those present included Tom Davis, Won Un, Connie Davis, Jim Printy, Mary Douglas, Mike Melton, Sybille Jobin, Jim Printy, Virginia Buchanan, Sandra Clemmer, and Joe Hill.

Committee Reports

Lay Leader: Connie Davis asked everyone to attend the briefing by Beth Christian on Sunday, March 3 at 9:30.

SPRC: Sybille Jobin reported that all employees had been interviewed and each expressed pleasure with their current position. Yi-Ping is currently taking organ lessons at \$60 per lesson. SPRC suggests that she be given \$300 for 10 lessons, she should pay the other half of the cost. This issue can be revisited if more lessons are needed. Yi-Pin will be absent from May 27 to June 20. Two of these absences will be covered by her two weeks' vacation. In addition, Yi-Ping has six absences during which the church pays for her absence. However, she is to make arrangements for subs for this time. If she needs additional vacation she will need to take an unpaid leave of absence. Also SPRC recommended that the following changes be made to the employee handbook: 0-2 years of service--2 weeks vacation earned; 3-4 years of service--3 weeks of vacation earned; 5+ years of service--4 weeks of vacation earned.

Finance: Joe Hill distributed the January 31, 2019 financial statement. This statement showed income for January was \$35,118.20. Expenses were \$25,204.68. Sarah Russell reported that she is working on moving some items from the monthly reports which appear as if they were budgeted items when they are actually not. For example, the Food Pantry is self supporting and is not part of the annual budget. Likewise the trustees durable equipment purchased should not be included in the budget report as is the kitchen fund. The Finance Committee also reported that there will be an Easter offering and that Council could decide the purpose of that offering at the March 26 meeting. Considering the current upheaval in the United Methodist Church attributed to The Way Forward, the Finance committee recommended to Council that apportionments for the upcoming months not be paid except for the Active Clergy Benefits and Pension Liability Assessment.

In April, Judicial council will meet to discuss constitutionality of motions and amendments that just passed in Feb., at Special General Conference.

In June, when the General Conference meets and a decision as to what Virginia UMC churches will do, we will decide about subsequent apportionment payments. Bill Bushman amended the motion to say that an escrow fund be set up to hold apportionment funds in the interim. The motion passed unanimously.

Concerning the 2019 General Conference which met from February 24-26, Pastor Won explained that four plans were proposed (One Church Plan, Connectional Conference Plan, Traditional Plan, Simple Plan) and confirmed that only one had been accepted, the Traditional Plan. He noted that all of Virginia's delegates had been in favor of the One Church Plan which was not adopted.

By Parliamentary rule, what the Special General Conference decided (with some still pending as to the constitutionality) is now the new policy of the United Methodist Church therefore, there will be no vote as we move forward other than 2020 General Conference.

Endowment: Tom Davis reminded Council that the value of our investments at the end of 2018 had lost value but the endowments have rebounded nicely thus far in 2019. Tom reported that he had considered developing a brochure about endowment but has decided to wait until the current UMC issues have been decided.

Trustees: Jim Printy reported that the sound system has been repaired and greatly improved. The phone lines and internet access are being evaluated for a potential upgrade. The family bathroom is also being improved. He reported that a safety plan is being developed in conjunction with the Staunton Fire Department. The May 15 socialite dinner will feature speakers from the Staunton Police Department.

Nurture: Jim Clemmer reported for Sandra that Nurture received a note of appreciation from Tom and Kim Mitchell for the reception provided for Connie's memorial service. The Committee noted that the special refreshments will be on the second Sunday of each month instead of the first Sunday. Volunteers are in place through June of this year; others are invited to participation. A cake and punch reception was held on February 17 to celebrate Hattie Eakin's Baptism. They discussed the Lenten Luncheon services including March 20 when Central will host. Linda Dinsmore and Sybille have kept up their visitation to VIP's. Perhaps children and youth will join in these visitations. Judi Jones, Diana Un, Susan Obaugh and Beth Blackmer have been joining the VIP visitation team.
