Online Giving Now Available

Central has taken advantage of an opportunity we learned about from the District Superintendent. He informed us that the Virginia Conference Treasurer has made use of the power of our Connection and has negotiated with a vendor called VANCO the free short-term use of their on-line giving services for local churches. This service has now been set up for Central and is available two ways:

1. Using your computer or tablet access the Central website (https://centralumcstaunton.org) where you will find a link for **Online Giving with VANCO** under the Worship tab.

Or,

2. Using your phone or tablet download the free mobile app from VANCO. Go to your phone's app store or Google Play and search for "GivePlus Church" to find the app quickly.

Whether you choose to use the link or the app, you have two options:


- a) Create an online profile so you can easily log back in for future giving and want to be able to view the history of all your giving to Central UMC. This is the preferred option for CUMC members. Note that your gifts can be one-time or recurring.
- b) Give as a guest without creating a profile. In this case you will not have access to your history of giving at Central.

You can give through your checking account or by credit/debit card. All transactions with VANCO are secure. You will receive a receipt for your donation via e-mail.

April 2020 Council Minutes

The Church Council of Central UMC was called to order by Chairperson Tom Davis at 2:02 pm on April 28. Due to the COVID-19 "shelter in place" mandate Council met electronically via Zoom. Sybille Jobin presented the devotion. Those present included Tom Davis, Connie Davis, Mary Douglas, Sybille Jobin, Bill Bushman, Susan Black, Marina Foltz, Won Un, Yi-Ping Chen, and Joe Hill.


Committee Reports

Lay Leader: Connie Davis reported that the Virginia Conference is on hold until September. She thanked Won that we have been able to worship remotely.

SPRC: Sybille Jobin reported that Sarah Russell's official last day will be May 31. A new administrative assistant, Madeleine Buttitta, has been hired. She will do the bookkeeping as well. Her first day will be June 1. Sybille reported that a farewell reception for Sarah has been canceled. Instead, we will be giving her a gift. The Nurture Committee will handle that.

Finance: Joe Hill reported on Central's financial status based on Sarah Russell's April Statement of Activities. The statement showed that the April income from all sources was \$27,724.39 and the expenses were \$29,856.33. The income included only \$7,366.00 from gifts by membership; \$15,857.65 was from quarterly distributions from our endowment accounts. He showed a chart which showed April giving for the past five years:

Due to the quarantine, Central has not held Sunday worship services since March 8. This chart clearly shows the negative effect this has had on our finances. He pointed out that Central has been keeping up with the Active Clergy line item on our apportionments but has not paid any of the other lines. For the first four months of 2020, our total of membership giving was \$40,025.30. For the same four months in 2019, which was not a good



year for CUMC financially, the total income from membership giving was \$54,089.00. He also reported that Central had applied for the Small Business Administration Paycheck Protection Program loan which is based on monthly payroll. We have been awarded \$18,237. This loan, for which closing will take place in the next ten days, will become a grant as long as we do not reduce staff in the next few months.

Endowment: Tom Davis reported that the parsonage endowment account has gone from approximately \$390,000 to \$310,000 then back to \$360,000 as of today. Information on the other accounts is not available at this time.

Trustees: Bill Bushman reported that the furnace work has been completed. However, a leak in the main supply gas line was discovered. The work on the replacing the gas line has begun. It will take a few more days to complete. The current outstanding balance for this project is \$16,422. The Trustees are also investigating a service contact for the system. The system of video monitoring of the doors was discussed. Two Ring doorbells have been ordered to add to this system. Also the Trustees discussed the awning over the door on Beverley Street. They are considering replacing or recovering this awning and possibly moving the current one to the Lewis Street door.

Nurture/Witness: Susan Black reported that Nurture/Witness committee has not met but she will check with members concerning the gift for Sarah.

Choir/Music: Yi-Ping Chen reported that she and Won have been videotaping the service and posting it on YouTube. She reported that some colleagues of hers have been using Central for practicing and will be joining her for some of the worship music in the future.

Outreach: Connie Davis reported that Outreach has been extremely busy during the pandemic. Caroline Jones sent in her report which included:

- Provide pre-packed boxes during the pandemic.
 However, clients are able to Virginia was named a
 Disaster Food Program state during the pandemic.
 As a result, USDA eligibility requirements were
 relaxed so that food may be distributed to a wider
 client base.
- The Blue Ridge Area Food Bank generously decided to waive all fees for food during the pandemic.
 Because of this, Central's pantry is able to provide

- much more food.
- Central will make fresh and frozen food choices when they get boxes.
- Volunteers follow CDC guidelines for safety, including wearing masks and gloves (most of the time) and using hand sanitizer and/or frequent hand washing. For safety, the most senior volunteers do not have client interaction.
- More than 7,800 pounds of food will be distributed in April.
- Pantry hours have been extended to Saturday mornings during soup distribution plus other times by appointment. Won manages those distributions. Many thanks to him!
- The soup ministry has expanded to include pantry distribution with many thanks to Millie Brown and Connie Davis. Each Saturday, Chicken Noodle and Vegetable soup is distributed. Vegetable soup is normally distributed on Wednesdays during Food Pantry. Also, masks have been distributed thanks to Lynn Hill, Cheryl Kent, Marilyn Blagg and Pat Collins.
- Connie reported that the luncheons at Trinity have been suspended.
- She also reported that a nice group of students from Boston had stayed at Central but a second volunteer group that was scheduled had to be canceled.
- A community wide picnic ("Central Chow Down") is planned for June 20.
- Connie reported that, as of April 25, 401 quarts of soup had been distributed. She thanked Yi-Ping for helping with cooking and Lynn Hill for supplying crackers.

Children and Youth: Mary Douglas had no report from youth activities since our services have been canceled. Won added that the youth Coffee House project is on hold but ready to go once the quarantine is over.

UMW: Caroline Jones reported that UMW meetings are currently suspended. They will reconvene as soon as it is safe to do so.

UMM: No report.

At Large: No report.

Pastor:

 Pastor Won reported that this has been a very difficult time which requires patience on our part. We should not rush to end social distancing.

- He is making phone calls, e-mails, Facebook posts, and providing online worship in order to connect with Central's members. A new microphone has been ordered to help with the audio on the worship recordings. Some CUMC groups have been using Zoom in order to connect with each other.
- He would like to have a Bible study such as a Sunday School Class via Zoom. He will also talk to John Bauman about having a Youth meeting using Zoom. Central has a Zoom subscription which allows for unlimited time for each Zoom session.
- This coming Sunday, May 3, there will be a drivethrough Communion service in the Beverley Street parking lot. Attendees will receive a bag with communion elements in it and will also receive vegetable soup.
- We received a grant from the Staunton Community Foundation of \$1,500 for the Kitchen Fund thanks to use for the soup ministry. St. Paul's UMC, Bob Ladd and Trinity Episcopal have also donated because of this project.
- He expressed thank you to all those who work in the Food Pantry and Soup Ministry. The work of these members have been very positively received in the community.
- He expressed thanks to the Trustees for all the recent work on the heating system.
- He thanked members for sending their gifts for continuing our ministries.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for May 26, 2020 at 2:00 pm. Joe Hill will provide devotions for the May meeting. The meeting concluded with the Lord's Prayer at 3:05 pm led by Marina Foltz.
